Remembering the Armenian Genocide

On April 24th, 2021, President Joe Biden became the first U.S. President to term the WWII massacre of Armenians under the then Ottoman Empire as a genocide. Previous presidents feared the use of the word "genocide" and what it could mean to Turkey who was our potential ally, however President Biden made a statement on the 106th anniversary of the massacre, remembering the horrific tradegy Armenia experienced a century ago. He stated his concern for the "atrocities" that were committed 106 years ago on this day, and wishes to move forward in his efforts in supporting global human rights (CNN, 2021). During this time, Armenia was suffering at the hands of the Ottoman Empire, which was quickly overlooked due to the immediate following of WWII. Every day survivors have to relive and remember the engraved images of what happened and continue to mourn over the ones they lost to the genocide. Many bear witness to horrific actions and were forced to relive that same feeling when this day came around. An official proclamation that was read on that day stated that from 1915 to 1923, about 1.5 million Armenians were killed in a systematic campaign that was issued by the Turkish Ottoman government (Hartford Courant, 2002). This silent holocaust will now be known as the WWII Armenian genocide, the worst out of all crimes that can be committed and will show how serious America is in supporting global human rights. The term "genocide" does not help to solve the tragic actions of the Ottoman Empire, however it gives a new light of hope to those who have suffered longer than anyone deserves to. Two Connecticut Universities Take the Step of Mandatory Vaccinations

With the spring semester not even over yet, colleges in Connecticut are already thinking about the fall, with many planning to have full in-person learning. Although most Connecticut universities have acknowledged giving the topic some thought, there are two in particular that have already informed it's Connecticut based student audience of its mandatory demand for student vaccinations. The first to enforce this pandemic restriction was Wesleyan University, sharing this news on April 13th, 2021, with many major features in Connecticut local headlines and newspapers such as NBC Connecticut and Hartford Courant. They stated that all students except those with medical or religious exemptions will be required to be fully vaccinated before their return to campus next fall. In order to enforce and encourage the vaccinations of their students, they are offering a Pfizer vaccine clinic in partnership with the Community Health Center for students who are currently already studying on campus. The starting date lasts for two days, April 24th and 25th for the first dose, while the ending date for the students to receive their second dose will run from the dates of May 15th through the 16th. Wesleyan reports that a total amount of 2,000 students have already registered themselves for this appointment. While they have not enforced teacher and staff vaccinations, they say that it is heavily encouraged.

Following in the footsteps of Wesleyan was Yale University, also publicly stating that they would be requiring student vaccinations for students to return in the fall. Yale University became the second school in Connecticut to publicly announce this requirement on April 19, 2021, almost a whole week after Wesleyan's release. An official announcement for the request of vaccinations is expected to come during the month of June, along with Yale's decision on whether or not the staff and faculty will be required to get the shot. The schools say that although the vaccination of students will be enforced, both Yale and Wesleyan University will require masks and social distancing in the fall. While there is no word yet if state colleges will make vaccinations mandatory, they are strongly encouraging students to get vaccinated before heading back into the classroom. In addition to Yale University, other colleges have also taken heed and notified further interest in the movement seeking further direction for their own states. These colleges include Duke, Notre Dame, Brown, Rutgers, and Northeastern University. Governor Ned Lamont says that the state will continue its mass mobile vaccinations in order to reach out to as many students as possible. His final words, "We'll find out later in the year if that's enough, and we'll be able to make some determinations later."



Rally Against New Vaccine Bill

After a series of hours consisting of long debate, it was expected that the Connecticut state senate would give their concluding legislative approval to a bill that would terminate Connecticut school's religious exemption for mandatory coronavirus vaccinations. Under this bill, exemption from this statewide requirement would only be permitted to you if you had justified medical reasoning. The proposal was eventually cleared in the Connecticut House of Representatives after a long period of 16 hour discussion, with a vote of 90 to 53 votes with a total number of seven legislators absent. The law in itself drew big support from many Democratic house members and lawmakers, while still collecting some support from a handful amount of Republican house members joining them to progress the measure. One Democrat representative from East Hartford in support of the bill, Representative Henry Ganga said, "Because we're in the middle of a health crisis, we need to take a firm stand on the efficacy of vaccinations. We need to keep our most vulnerable residents in our decision making, always. This policy will help prevent the spread of illness and disease to those who are most vulnerable – those who have diabetes, autoimmune diseases, who make up many of our neighbors. While they cannot be vaccinated, we must do what we have to do to protect them".

While an overwhelming majority of the house voted to pass the bill, some disagreed with its claims. One member of the house in particular being Representative Anne Dauphinais who stated that this was, "arguably the worst bill we've seen in the history of Connecticut." Governor Ned Lamont stated that if the bill were to clear both chambers, he would sign it. On Tuesday, the Senate began its debate with a crowd full of several thousand people gathered outside of the capitol to show their strong opposition to the details of the bill. The rally started off with a service of prayer, and incorporated featured appearances from nationally known critics of the vaccination legislation, one in particular being Robert F. Kennedy Jr. As citizens joined outside the capitol building in Hartford, they often shouted chants like, "kill the bill" and swore that they would remain on the capitol grounds until the Senate had voted. A minister of a non-denominational church in Hartford, Reverend Yashica Blue stated that, "This is discrimination and it goes against our First Amendment". Tara Carr, a Brookfield mother of four agreed making a similar claim in saying, "I watched my friends die to protect religious freedom and now my home state is taking it away. It's disgusting, representatives should be ashamed of themselves."

Counseling with Carese

Hello Students and Staff of ASI, we have already made it to May! For some students, this is a demanding time of year as Advanced Placement exams are scheduled throughout the months of May and June. AP classes require diligence and great time management to handle the course load, so hopefully you began your studying process earlier in the school year. However, there are still ways you can prepare for your AP exams.

The first and most important is don't be afraid to ask questions, that is what your teachers are here for! You do not want to go into any AP test blindly.

Due to COVID-19, this year's testing may be different for some of you. If you are taking a virtual exam, make sure to visit College Board to see how the online platform and software will work.


