
School Mission: Empower learning, unleash talent and lead a culture of creativity to solve global problems.

New School Hours

Our school hours have changed. We now start school at 7:30AM and end our school day at 2:30PM.

New School Schedule

The schedule we used last year was built on the concept of having 4 classes every other day with the periods lasting over 90 minutes. Unfortunately, this model failed to give our school the quality education every student deserves. This year, students will have six classes per day with



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57 minute periods. We feel this model will help all students academically to ensure their success.

New Academic Core Teams

Students will be assigned to an academic team who will support the students and parents. Each team has an assigned Team Leader. These team leaders are responsible for their team, together with a group of dedicated teachers will help strengthen students' academic ability and become leaders in life.

Sixth Grade Academy

Grade 6 students will be assigned to the "Sixth Grade Academy" which will focus on the social, emotional and academic needs of students. This group of teachers were hand selected by the team leader, Mrs. Callery. They are dedicated to the transition of students from elementary school to middle school. They have planned many activities to ease the transition to our school. The sixth grade will be working with a new SEL (Social and Emotional Learning) program called Second Step. The new Second Step Middle School Program is a first-of-its-kind SEL curriculum that's modern, web-based, and responsive to the needs of today's students and educators. It's underpinned by the latest research in adolescent brain development and social psychology, and it's been refined through multiple pilot programs in classrooms across the country. The result of this program doesn't just help kids do better in school. It helps them do better in life.

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Ninth Grade Academy

Grade 9 students have the most difficult transition of all grades in the school. Research from many educational studies indicates that ninth graders struggle with rigor of academics along with the emotional struggles and pressures of being in high school. With this in mind, we have partnered with the Nutmeg Big Bother/Big Sisters organization with the funding from the Domus Foundation (https://domuskids.org/about-us/) to bring the Mentor 2.0 program to our ninth grade students. We were selected for Mentor 2.0 after a lengthy competitive process with many other high schools. We are the only school in Connecticut to have this program. This is very exciting and promising that this program will help our students with their academic needs. Mentor2.0 includes a research-based curriculum that equips students with the skills and background knowledge necessary for college and career success. This program will match an adult mentor to all 110 ninth grader students who will mentor the students for four years until graduation. We also will be offering the Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools (CBITS) program for all ninth graders. This will help support the emotional

needs of our students. CBITS is designed to reduce symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), depression, behavioral problems, improve functioning, grades, attendance, peer & parent support, and coping skills of students. This program will be led by our counseling staff and overseen by Clifford Beers Foundation and UCLA. Ms. Juda is our 9th grade Team Leader and had the opportunity to hand select her team of teachers who will be dedicated to helping all of our ninth grade students.

No Cell Phone Rule for Grade 6-9

After a careful review of our school's data concerning behavioral incidents stemming from cell phone use in grades 6-9. After, reviewing the current research surrounding the use of cell phones in school, we have decided to ban cell phone use of all students in Grades 6-9. Students will not be allowed to use these devices during school hours. I have outlined a few reasons below:

• Lack of Social Media Control

Sites students regularly use are: Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Vine, Reddit, Tumblr, Kik, Snapchat, Pheed, Wanelo and 4Chan. These sites have contributed to and ruined the lives of many teenagers. At Innovation cell phones are the number one reason for discipline. It has a major impact in students behavioral in the classroom, we noticed an increase this past school year 2017-18. Students at this age are just not mature and/or responsible enough to handle the social media part of having a cell phone. Students typically will check these sites hundreds of times in a school day and react emotionally to what they read or see. Additionally, students have taken pictures and video of staff and

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their peers without permission and posted them to many social media sites. This breaks the confidentiality agreements that protect the rights of our students and staff.

• **Inappropriate Materials**

While we can limit the availability of many websites that can be viewed on our wireless network, the reality with today's world of technology students find links that slip through the system. Students who have a cellular plan will not be accessing the internet through a monitored network and will be able to access any site, app or program.

• <u>Distraction from Schoolwork.</u>

We have found that with the temptation of social media and texting in their hands, students focus solely on their social life instead of the lesson plan and their own learning.

Child Predators and Cyberbullying.

Child predators are a problem everywhere. Using digital devices at school creates just that much more exposure and potential danger for students. In addition, cyberbullying is also an increasing issue. Permitting use of digital devices in the classroom at this age leads to more of it.

• Cell Phone Consequences:

- <u>First offense</u> teacher takes phone until end of period and returns it to the student.
- <u>Second offense</u> Security delivers the phone to Mr. McCain, Principal of ASI. Student will have to see Mr. McCain at the end of the day to conference and get phone back.
- <u>Third offense</u> Mr. McCain will lock the phone in a secured school safe until parent comes to get it.
- Fourth offense Detention/Suspension.

Parents we need your support in ensuring that all our students understand these rules and the importance of no cell phone use in school. We recommend taking some time to discuss these new rules at home. Remember a true partnership is the key to our student's success.

NEW FACES JOINING OUR ASI FAMILY

<u>Melinda Chaffee</u> – will replace Carlos Lawrence as our new Special Education Teacher. Stacy comes to us from Hall Memorial School where she has been a middle school Special Education teacher. She also taught English at Two Rivers Middle School for eight years and worked at Moylan School in Hartford. Melinda graduated with a Bachelor's degree from the Franklin Pierce University in History and a Master's degree from Southern Connecticut State University in English.

<u>Kelly Price</u> – is our new Literacy Coach. Kelly was the Secondary ELA Curriculum Specialist at CREC and has taught English at Public Safety Academy, Granby Memorial High School and Tolland High School. Kelly was Teacher of the Year in Granby in 2011 and a semifinalist for the Connecticut TOY.

Kelly graduated with a Bachelor's degree from the University of Connecticut in Design and Resource Management and a Master's degree from Florida State University in English.

<u>Jordan Schmitzer</u> – will replace Emily Cyr as our new English teacher. Jordan comes to us from Public Safety Academy where she has been teaching English for four years. Jordan graduated with a Bachelor's degree from the University of Connecticut in English and a Master's degree from UConn in Education.

<u>Mikayla Pascucci</u> – will replace Martha Shepard as our new Special Education teacher. This will be Mikayla's first teaching experience and comes to us with a very impressive college resume including winning the Madeline McKernan Equity and Education Advocacy Award and the Kappa Delta Pi Leadership Award. She did her student teaching at Bower Elementary School in Manchester. Mikayla was a Bachelor's degree from the University f Hartford in Special Education.

<u>Jesecia Miller</u> – will replace Drew Bennett as our new STEM teacher. Jesecia comes to us from Public Safety Academy where she was teaching Chemistry. She previously taught Chemistry at

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Hartford High School and was a science teacher at Denbigh High School in Jamaica. Jesecia graduated with a Bachelor's degree from the University of the West Indies in Chemistry and Bio Chemistry and a Master's degree from Southern Connecticut State University in Chemistry.

<u>John Knapp</u> – will replace Megan Legassey as our new Guidance Counselor. John comes to us from Public Safety Academy where he served as a high school counselor. John graduated with a Bachelor's degree from Plymouth State University in Physical Education and a Master's degree from Capella University in School Counseling.

ASI General Information

School begins on **August 29th for our students**. School begins at 7:30 AM and concludes at 2:30 PM. A Rules Assembly has been scheduled for students in each grade. All of our students will receive and review the CREC Academy of Science and Innovation Student Handbook. The handbook will outline expectations for academics and behavior along with a variety of other important items. During this time we will review all school rules, outline our discipline procedures and talk about maintaining high standards within our school community. The student handbook will be posted on our website for parents to review.

Food Program:

We serve all students breakfast, lunch and dinner. Dinner is only served during the afterschool program. More detail regarding the afterschool program will follow at a later time. These meals for all students are FREE. However, if your child wants a la carte items and/or extra food they will need to pay for it at time of service.

Dress Code Requirements

We will also review expectations and how to communicate with staff, special events, college preparation, and any questions you may have. We encourage you to attend, especially if this is your first child attending middle school. This program is intended for parents **only**.

To help <u>parents of ninth graders</u> with the transition to high school, a special program will be held on September 25th from 6:00PM to 7:30PM. The focus of this meeting is grading, expectations for college and preparation for the rigors of high school.

Lastly, to assist you in preparing your child for school below I included some information that will be very helpful for you and your student. I encourage you to participate in various school functions throughout the year. I look forward to meeting you and your child.





How to Prepare for Success at ASI

Organizational Skills

Students' organizational skills become increasingly important for the achievement of success during the coming school years. School supplies which effectively assist in organization are a great asset for each student. Based upon our experience with student needs, we have included a list of supplies needed to start the year. We have found that trapper keepers and spiral notebooks are not successful organizational tools. A notebook serves as a supplemental textbook; therefore it is necessary for students to have it in class each day. Frequently, additional materials are given to the students to assist them in their learning. These materials can only be organized effectively in a three ring binder.

Homework/Classwork

All homework is designed to extend learning experiences and to stimulate pupils to study independently. It is recognized that pupils work at different rates and with varying degrees of efficiency. These factors are considered when assignments are made. Several teachers in the various subject areas coordinate homework. Each teacher has the responsibility for setting reasonable limits on the requirements for preparation beyond class time. This is done in cooperation with other teachers. Class time is provided for supervised study to ensure thorough understanding of assignments and efficient work habits. Time at home should be set aside for the completion of assigned work. It should be expected that ninth graders will have approximately one to one and a half hours of homework each night. It is most important that students complete all homework assignments by the due date. Hastily completed assignments of poor quality, and partially completed assignments seriously detract from student learning. Students are expected to complete these assignments conscientiously; your supervision of this important aspect of their learning can help them achieve greater success in school. If it

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appears that homework assignments take much longer than the time mentioned above, then a problem may exist. Please call the school if you have any concerns in this area.

Other Tips for Students and Parents for Success at Innovation

- 1. **Get Organized** Come to class with all necessary books (including your agenda), three ring binder, pencils, pens, calculator, notebooks, and an independent reading book. Write down assignments in your agenda. Keep you notebook neat and organized by subject.
- 2. **Be Attentive in Class** Stay focused on what is happening in the classroom. Take good notes, ask questions when you are confused about something (chances are, if you are confused, so are others).
- 3. **Get Involved** There are many clubs, councils, and organizations at ASI. Get involved! It will greatly enhance your high school experience.
- 4. **Set Aside Quiet Time for Homework** Block some time at home to do homework. If you establish a routine, you will discipline yourself to complete assignments.
- 5. **Preparation for Classwork and Homework -** All written assignments, except math, are to be submitted in pen. Cursive writing is preferred. The use of a word processor is encouraged. Pages torn from a spiral notebook are not acceptable and all assignments must include a proper heading.
- 6. **Set Goals** Decide on what you want to accomplish at ASI and then develop a plan to achieve it. Remember a dream is only a dream until you write it down. Once it is written down it becomes a goal!
- 7. **Never Quit** Don't underestimate you. If you are having trouble with something, ask for help. We are here for you.
- 8. **Follow the School Rules** There is so much to do! You can't afford to hold yourself back. We can't allow you to hold others back.
- 9. **Have Fun** The intellectual, social and physical aspects of middle and high school can be very enjoyable, if you have the right attitude.
